Letter From the President

Just returned from the NPC Potato Expo held in Orlando, FL Jan. 4-6, 2010. The weather was most un-Florida like and we spent most of what little time we had outside trying to stay warm. The meeting itself was well attended with about 1,100 participants and a very full agenda. I am very proud and happy to say that PAA was well represented. At the invitation of John Keeling, Exec. VP & CEO of NPC, PAA members displayed 15 posters on a variety of topics in an area right in the center of all the action. We may also have the opportunity to display posters at next year's Potato Expo scheduled for Jan. 5-7, 2011 in Las Vegas.

I enjoyed several tremendous presentations at the meeting in FL. Many of them got me thinking about the pace at which things change. My granddad was born in 1890 and lived to the ripe old age of 93. FINAL CALL for Papers

This is the Second and Final Call for Papers to be presented at the 94th Annual Meeting of The Potato Association of America. This meeting will be held August 15-19, 2010 at the CH2M HILL Alumni Centre, Oregon State University, Corvallis, Oregon, USA. The recommended hotel, Hilton Garden Inn, is a short walk from the conference facility.

PAA members are invited to present papers dealing with all facets of the potato industry. Graduate students who are PAA members are encouraged to enter the Frank L Haynes Graduate Student Research Competition.

Authors are required to submit abstracts for papers they wish to present, whether orally, as a poster or in the Frank L Haynes Graduate Student Research Competition. The abstracts for all papers (oral, poster and Graduate Student Research Competition) presented at the Annual Meeting will be published in a postmeeting issue of the *American Journal of Potato Research*. Abstracts of papers listed in the meeting program, but not presented, will not be published in the *AJPR*.

At the Annual Meeting, all oral paper presentations will be of a uniform 15-minute length. Authors should plan a 12- to 14-minute presentation with the balance of time devoted to questions. Computer projectors will be available for PowerPoint presentations. Please bring your PowerPoint presentation (2007 or earlier version) on a portable USB drive.

Display boards will be provided for posters. Maximum poster size is 4 feet wide x 3 feet tall (48 inches wide x 36 inches tall).

Abstracts will be accepted until March 19, 2010. Submit abstracts as an e-mail attachment to loretta.mikitzel@gnb.ca with "PAA Abstract" as the e-mail subject. You will receive an email acknowledging receipt of the abstract. Abstracts submitted after that date will be returned to the author.

Abstract submission checklist:

- 1. Combination of title, author(s), their affiliations and body of abstract not to exceed 2000 characters, including spaces.
 - 2. Underline the presenter's name
 - 3. Include PAA Membership Number of one (1) author
- 4. Indicate presentation method (oral; oral graduate student; poster)
- 5. Include presentation Section (breeding and genetics, plant protection, physiology, utilization and marketing, extension, production and management or certification)
- 6. Abstract formatting guidelines may be found on the conference website at http://oregonstate.edu/conferences/paa2010/abstracts.html or PAA website http://potatoassociation.org.

NOTE the *maximum* abstract length is <u>2.000 characters</u>. This size limit includes spaces and pertains to the combined abstract title, authors and their affiliations and the body of the abstract. <u>Only the first 2.000 characters of the submitted abstract will be</u>

<u>printed in the program</u>- please keep your abstract within the maximum allowable length.

Abstracts will be accepted until March 19, 2010.

Completed HLM nominations and all supporting documentation should be submitted electronically in MS Word or PDF format to Past President Chuck Brown and are due by March 19, 2010.

All members should take the time to think about their colleagues and their service to the industry to see if they might qualify for HLM in The PAA. This is a wonderful award and recognition, but it can not happen without going through the nomination process.

Frank L Haynes Graduate Student Research Competition Papers

This is the FINAL Call For Papers to be entered in the Frank L Haynes Graduate Student Research Competition (GSRC) to be held at the 94th Annual Meeting of The Potato Association of America.

The purpose of the GSRC is to promote graduate student participation in PAA through presentation of research papers at the Annual Meeting. Participants are also encouraged to submit manuscripts for publication in the *American Journal of Potato Research*.

General Information

- 1. The author must be a current (or recent) graduate student at the time the abstracts are due March 19, 2010.
- 2. First place winners from previous PAA meetings are not eligible to participate.
- Research reported must have been done while a graduate student.
- 4. The paper must be orally presented. Poster papers and symposium presentations do not qualify for the FLHGSRC.
- 5. Students are required to submit abstracts for papers they wish to present in the Competition via e-mail. Abstracts will be accepted until March 19, 2010.
- 6. No new students may register after the deadline or at the meeting.
- 7. Winners will be announced and honored at the annual banquet. Participants will receive a free Banquet ticket for themselves supplied by the LAC.
- 8. Graduate students must be members of the PAA and may not use their advisor's ID. (**Membership information is found on The PAA website: http://potatoassociation.org/

General Criteria for Judging: Papers and presentations will be judged on the following basis:

- A. Quality of research and content: 60%
- B. Effectiveness of presentation: 40%

Up to five awards may be made at the discretion of the committee in the amount of \$350 for 1st place, \$250 for 2nd place, \$150 for 3rd place, \$100 for 4th place, \$100 for 5th place.

FINAL Call For Nominations for "Outstanding Extension Project Award"

The Outstanding Extension Project Award was developed in 2009 by the Extension Section of The PAA to recognize outstanding Extension projects or programs, printed publications, websites, workshops, newsletters, etc., that have made significant contributions to education on potato. At this time the Selection Committee is seeking nominations due by March 19, 2010 for this award to be presented at the 94th Annual Meeting in Corvallis, Oregon. Information pertaining to this award and the selection process is presented below:

A. Award Recipient Eligibility:

- 1. The nominated Recipient must be a member in good standing with The PAA. For team nominations, at least one person must be a member in good standing with the PAA.
- 2. Although the Recipient need not have an Extension appointment, the project or program must be related to Extension-type activities. The project or program must be either on-going at the time of the Annual Meeting the year of recognition or have been completed no more than 30 months (2.5 years) prior to the Annual Meeting in the year of recognition.
- 3. The Recipient must attend the Annual Meeting to receive the award, unless exempted by the selection committee because of extenuating circumstances.
 - 4. Nominators do not have to be members of The PAA.

B. Selection Process

- 1. No more than one Extension Award will be presented at any Annual Meeting of The PAA.
- 2. The Selection Committee consists of the current officers of the Extension Section plus the past Extension Section chair who shall serve as chair of the Outstanding Extension Project Award Selection Committee.
- 3. Nominator must complete the nomination form, that is available on the PAA website, along with submitting a written review, not to exceed 1000 words, of specific project or program being nominated for the Award.
- 4. At least two letters of support must also be sent to the selection committee chair.
- 5. Nomination form, written review, and letters of support must be submitted to the selection committee Chair no later than March 19, 2010. For further information, please see the website: http://potatoassociation.org/

EAPR News

Co-operation between the PAA and EAPR

Willie Kirk (Michigan State University) was endorsed to as PAA representative to EAPR at the PAA conference in 2009 at the PAA's Annual Meeting in Fredericton, NB, Canada. Dr. Louise Cooke (Applied Plant Science & Biometrics Division, Agri-Food & Biosciences Institute (AFBI), Newforge Lane, Belfast, Northern Ireland, BT9 5PX is the EAPR representative to the PAA. Louise attended the PAA conference in New Brunswick and was welcomed and given the opportunity to speak at the Business Meeting. Louise is a long-standing member of The PAA and has regularly attended annual meetings (other contact details on PAA website (http://potatoassociation.org) in the Member's Directory available to Members Only).

Willie and Louise hope that their combined efforts will further both societies. The question of whether having two potato research organizations, the EAPR and The PAA, will continue to be viable was raised at the PAA business meeting: this will depend on how membership numbers are maintained. It has been suggested that a joint meeting between the two Assns could take place in the future. The EAPR plans its triennial mtgs nearly six years ahead, with the President of the EAPR hosting the mtg in the home country. If we wanted to jointly meet in 2017 or 2020 we would have to register this soon. Chuck Brown has suggested possible mtg locations such as Iceland or the Azores. Chuck noted that the Azores were the first landing point of the potato from S.A. in 1567. An alternative may be to have an "extraordinary" mtg in the interim between EAPR triennial mtgs.

Thanks to Craig Yencho, the LAC Co-ordinator for the annual PAA conference in 2011, which will take place in No Carolina, 14-18 August, which do not clash with the EAPR Triennial (24-29 July).
